

My heart also goes out to all those whose livelihoods are threatened, and will be threatened, by the immensely adverse effects that the latest pandemic is having on financial stability around the world.

It is now, during the disturbingly rapid spread of this COVID-19, that we are again blessed with the celebration of Easter. For the absolute majority of Christians around the globe, as



indeed for those who choose to celebrate Easter without Christ in their lives, this year's celebrations will be very different to what so many of us are comfortably used to as the typically traditional events surrounding Easter week.

For us Christians, the majority will not be able to physically attend those events that all go to mark our remembrance of the Passion of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, including the crucial church service on Easter Sunday. On Good Friday we remember in particular the immense suffering of our Lord, at the hands of the Romans and His other enemies. Whilst the physical suffering of Christ is beyond comprehension to many of us this was indeed only a part of the entire suffering that He had to endure.

Throughout human history suffering, in one way or another, has been a part of every single life, from Adam and Eve to present day mankind. It was indeed God, through his living son, Jesus Christ, who suffered as flesh for all our sins and ultimately, through this sacrifice, gave us the gift of participating in the true 'glory of God' in our freedom to embrace our Lord and Saviour through our Baptism and entrance into Christianity.

HE Conv. Bailiff Løvheim, or 'H' as he was affectionately known to me, was a key person in the development of the Order. I first met him at the Grosvenor Hotel, Victoria, London with HE Conv. Bailiff Eddie Power GCSJ CMSJ MSSJ, who then was the Prior of England. This meeting, and the discussions that followed, led to many new members joining us from Denmark and Norway, and the creation of the Grand Priory of Scandinavia, of which H was the first Grand Prior.

There have been many changes since those early days but H's commitment to the Order was unwavering, as was his determination to advance the process of integration, the most touching part of which was his reconciliation with his friend and Brother HE Bailiff Emeritus Dag von Schantz GCSJ CMSJ MSSJ.

I shall miss H enormously; he was a great friend, sage adviser and tactician, brilliant lawyer, sometimes temperamental and often mischievous, but always loyal.

My thoughts and prayers are with H's son, Chev. Rune Løvheim KCSJ and his wife Debbie, and Rune's brother and sisters and their families.

H is now reunited with his beloved wife Inger, and may they both rest in peace.

A MESSAGE FROM HE CONVENTUAL BAILIFF ALASTAIR REDPATH STEVENS GCS.J CMS.J

Et Pestilentia Venit (And the Pestilence Came)

Your Excellencies and Dear Brothers and Sisters in St John,

I am writing this on Palm Sunday (in the Gregorian Calendar), that day when, Matthew tells us, Jesus rode into Jerusalem from Bethphage, mounted on a donkey, thus fulfilling the words of the prophet Zechariah.

We are told there was a crowd of people, some of whom spread their cloaks on the road, whilst others spread branches from trees, which John tells us were palm trees. The crowd shouted "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

How excited must that crowd have been: all shouting and cheering, witnessing the coming of the King, such that when Jesus entered Jerusalem, the whole City was in turmoil. It must have been a day that remained long in the memory of those who were there.

But now the streets are all but deserted: the World in the grip of the COVID-19 pandemic. There are no crowds, but people who are isolated, many fearful, others sick or around those who are sick, many knowing those who have died or dying themselves.

What a contrast with that joyous day in Jerusalem, but a contrast that heightens the message of Holy Week, which saw Jesus tortured, rejected, disclaimed, His Passion and death on Good Friday and then glorious resurrection on Easter Sunday.

We will all miss being with our communities and sharing in the rituals during this Holy Week, but we remain members of our great Order. The Order is not great because of what it does, but because of who we are as its Christian Knights and Dames and what we do as a direct result of that conviction.

Much as the donkey bears the mark of the cross, we too, as Christians, bear that mark. It is not visible, but is manifest by our character because the mark of the Crucified Christ is one of Charity, which is a gift from God.

The Old Order witnessed many plagues in Malta, and many Knights died in service to the people. We should not be reckless with our lives, but where we are able we should help those in need, cheerfully and boldly, but with prudence.

As St. Vincent de Paul observed on many occasions: totum opus nostrum in operatione consistit (all our work ends in action).

The Petit Conseil continues to meet using CROVV and you should all be receiving the Minutes from your Priors and Commanders.

CROVV is available to all units of the Order having been donated to the Order for our use by Chev Ton van de Ven KCSJ. It is secure, being end-to-end encrypted, free, and an excellent tool particularly in these times when Priory Council and Chapter members cannot meet together in person. I do

recommend that units use it as a valuable way of keeping in touch, along with WhatsApp, Twitter and other social media platforms.

As you will have seen from my last letter to all members, the current situation is such that the Priory of Italy Investiture in Corridonia has had to be postponed to a date to be determined.

The Petit Conseil will meet by CROVV on 23 May to consider the position as regards the other approved Investitures in Tampere, London and Edinburgh, ahead of its scheduled meeting on 1 July.

Although I would have thought it unnecessary to deal with this matter, it seems that some officers in the O.S.J. are confusing the fact that some members of the Order are Freemasons, with the Order itself being Masonic, or indeed associated with Freemasonry.

Please let me make it clear that the O.S.J. is not a Masonic Order, but a great Order of Chivalry; nor is the Order associated with Freemasonry, save as regards the matter of individual memberships.

I fully appreciate that there are doctrinal issues for some members, but the Order is an ecumenical Order and what is more the Order's Charter specifically requires it to operate in accordance with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which includes the freedom of association.

It was this same strict adherence to the Declaration that led to the admission of Dames as full members of the O.S.J. despite opposition from some less-enlightened former members.

Whatever anyone's views of Freemasonry, the rights of Freemasons have been upheld by the courts. Furthermore, the charitable work done by Freemasons is well-known across the world. As we are taught, "Ye shall know them by their fruits... every good tree bringeth forth good fruit; but a corrupt tree bringeth forth evil fruit. A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit... Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them."

Our Order is an ecumenical Christian Order, and draws its strength from that community of spirit and the deep beliefs of its members, committed as they all are to the Order's objects as set out in the Charter and ever mindful of the motto Pro Fide, Pro Utilitate Hominum.

My thoughts and prayers are with you all, particularly during these troubled times, as we pray continually, for God shall give us comfort and gladness instead of sorrow.



Because of the serious coronavirus situation in Denmark, with borders closed and everyone advised against congregating with others, all meetings including all OSJ events have been cancelled and are currently on hold. We had originally planned to hold a large open convention in Fensmark, Zealand on 16th March with invited guests from the municipality of Vordingborg and from the Marine Association. We had arranged for a guest speaker, a specialist external university lecturer, to give a very informative historical presentation on how the Order found its way from Malta to Yugoslavia. We had also organised a dinner and musical entertainment. However, we have had to postpone this event, although we will reschedule it as soon as possible.


Several of our Knights and Dames have been very active in helping many elderly, frail and vulnerable individuals at this most difficult time, including delivering food and essentials direct to their homes. The bag of goods is placed just outside the door of the recipient who then collects and picks it up once we have walked to a suitable safe distance away. A number of our members are also involved in a shared kitchen scheme where food is prepared for the vulnerable and homeless. However, they have discovered that it is difficult to persuade users of the hostels to maintain a distance of one and a half meters from each other in order to prevent the spread of the virus, both in the cafeteria and in the sleeping quarters.



PRIORY OF THE BALTIC



The Priory of the Baltic held a very successful Investiture in Turku, Finland on Saturday 1st June last year, attended by 70 guests from seven different countries. We are pleased to report that the event realised a financial surplus of some 1500 euros, which we donated, partly to the Mother and Child Relief Fund, partly to the Hope organisation in the Lohja area and partly to assist the social work undertaken by Saint Mikael's Church in Turku (our Investiture was held in Saint Mikael's Church in Turku city centre).

"OPERATION OLD CLOTHES" - NOVEMBER 2019

In November of 2019 all members of the Priory of the Baltic had a great excuse to tidy out their wardrobes and donate all their good quality old clothes to the Salvation Army and the Finnish Red Cross in aid of those in need. We can, of course, donate our old and unwanted clothes at any time but we decided to turn our charitable giving into a lighthearted competition between Commanderies to find out which Commandery would rise to the challenge and donate most.

Over 200 pieces of good quality old clothes were donated (in addition to some donations of cash) to various charitable organisations in Turku, and over 300 pieces of old clothes were donated to the Hope organisation, which helps support poorer families in Lohja. Our lighthearted competition was won by the Commandery of Uusimaa in Lohja.

SAINT HENRIK'S DAY – JANUARY 2020

A number of Christian chivalric orders operating in Finland held a joint traditional Saint Henrik's Day meeting in January 2020. Members from OSJ, HOSJ, SOSJ and the Orders of Constantini Magni, Lazarus, Johanniter, Order of the Holy Sepulchre and SMO of Temple were invited. More than 100 Knights and Dames participated in Vespers, led by Archbishop Emeritus Jukka Paarma. After Vespers we held a dinner, during which there was a short presentation from each Order in attendance. The OSJ Priory of Finland's speech was presented by Vice Chancellor Esko Vainio and the OSJ Priory of the Baltic's presentation was given by Vice Prior Ralf Sundgren.

As many of you will be aware, Saint Henrik is the Patron Saint of Finland and, in the 12th century, as Bishop Henrik of Uppsala, he brought Christianity to Finland when he arrived with King Erik of Sweden following a successful crusade. Sadly, however, he was brutally murdered in the year 1156 AD.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP EDUCATION IN AFRICA

The Priory of the Baltic donated seed money to the University of Iringa for its BAME entrepreneurship education programme in March 2020. The donation was primarily as a result of a targeted gift from a member of the Priory. The seed money acts as a source of a start up loan for University students enabling them to set up in business. Two members of the OSJ Baltic Priory personally covered the cost which enabled the Tanzanian Mwalimu Nyerere Memorial Academy's (MNMA) High Management Team 2018 and the Tanzanian University of Iringa's High Management Team 2019, to come to Finland in 2019. They visited Turku University of Applied Sciences and several other Universities to learn about our Finnish entrepreneurship education, enable them to develop entrepreneurship education programme in Tanzania, with the aim of reducing youth unemployment in a country which is fast growing, not only in terms of population, but also in GDP.





Prior HE Bailiff Vesa V. Viitaniemi, GCSJ FWR K CMFS and Chamberlain, Chev. Jaakko KSJ were privileged, once again, to be invited to take part in the University of Iringa's Graduation Day celebrations on 7th December 2019. The Graduation Day was a day to remember with more than 2000 people present and some 20 reporters in attendance. Prior Vesa and Chamberlain Jaakko were seated next to Tanzania's third President, The Honorable Mr Benjamin Mkapa and Mama Anna Mkapa, for over four hours, under the hot African sun, in the Southern Highlands of Tanzania. During the ceremony the University awarded two Honorary Doctorates, one of which was presented to Prior Vesa in recognition of his ten years collaborating with the University of Iringa and for his services to the people of Tanzania – Bailiff Viitaniemi is the first European to receive such a prestigious award from the University. The only other Honorary Doctorate awarded was to the former Chief Lawyer of the East African Community.

Easter is the time of year that should particularly remind us that Christ offered Himself freely for our redemption and He sent the Holy Spirit to be with us continually for over 2000 years. Our Order has also been working continually for more than 900 years protecting our faith and providing charity to our fellow man.

It is within these principles and ideals that the Independent Commandery of Monaco-Italy continues to operate, particularly with regard to our Christian Brothers and Sisters who, as refugees from the Middle East, have fled their country of origin due to persecution because of their faith.

In addition to the ongoing work with refugees, members of the Commandery are also involved in various other charitable activities, some of which are one-off and some of which take place on a regular basis. However, our actions with the refugees tend to be recurring such as the weekly French classes, sometimes even several times a week, and the administrative assistance given to help them obtain employment.

Some earlier activities Brothers and Sisters in the Commandery of Monaco-Italy undertook included raising funds to support a pilgrimage to Lourdes for a group of the refugees and organising an excursion to Île Saint-Honorat in the Bay of Cannes in France for a group, accompanied by a few of our members. The Commandery was also involved in providing a vehicle to the Priest in charge of the Parish of Bargemon, which hosts refugees, and our members also organised an enormous picnic for the refugees welcomed into the Principality and into the Parish

of Bargemon (Var – France). The Commandery organised donations of clothes and foodstuffs for those in need and, in collaboration with our Brothers in the Priory of France, donations of machine tools for a carpentry workshop run by the refugees in Bargemon.

General Meeting of members

In order to comply with the requirements of the Government of the Principality of Monaco, and in accordance with the Rules of our Order, the Annual Meeting of the Monaco Italy Association of Saint John of Jerusalem, and a Chapter Meeting of the Independent Commandery of Monaco-Italy was held on 16th December 2019. The meeting reviewed the Commandery's activities which had taken place during 2019 and noted that there had been sixteen additional activities in addition to the weekly involvement with the refugees. The members discussed and considered a number of possible future projects for the Commandery and received and reviewed the Financial Statements for the period.

Each year, at Christmas time, members from the Commandery join with their Brothers and Sisters in the Priory of France distributing toys to handicapped and severely disabled children in the hospital









of San Salvador in Hyères (Var - France). So it was, on Sunday 15th December, that no less than 10 Knights and Dames of the Independent Commandery of Monaco-Italy joined with their Brothers and Sisters from the Priory of France, to distribute more than 500 toys, sweets and candies to the sick children. Last Christmas was our 10th year of ingathering toys and distributing them to these sick children. The members of our Commandery were not only heavily involved in collecting a large number of toys, but were also particularly generous in acquiring new toys for the hospitalised children.

Faith, hope and charity (or love) have led us, as humble Knights and Dames in the Order of Saint John, to remain faithful to our oath - Pro Fide, Pro Utilitate Hominum!

I am pleased to announce that Ilias, one of our refugee friends and Brothers who resides in Monaco and who regularly helps us with our various activities, has now been confirmed as an Aspirant and will soon be invested into our beloved Order as a Knight of Honour.

COMMANDERY OF PORTUGAL



The Commandery of Portugal has 11 Members made up of 7 Knights, including one member of the Clergy, and 4 Dames. The Commandery has its Headquarters at Casa de Fervença, Gilmonde Parish, Barcelos in the Archdiocese of Braga, situated 5 km from the historic city of Barcelos, in the north of Portugal.

Our story begins on 22nd June 2015 when, under the patronage of H.E. Bailiff Roberto Volpe, 4 Knights and a Dame who were to become members of the newly created Commandery of Portugal, were invested into OSJ-Malta in La Valleta, Malta.

However, as soon as the installation of the Commandery of Portugal became public knowledge, the Sovereign Military Order of Malta (SMOM) issued a communiqué expressing their disapproval and accusing the Commandery of usurping the rights of SMOM on the basis that they believed they were the sole authority on such matters. The Commandery consulted with our Headquarters in Malta and sent a considered response to SMOM but received no reply. Although we heard nothing further, this intervention by SMOM caused the Commandery of Portugal to go through a period of stagnation. Members of the Commandery continued to meet and we continued to prepare the Commandery's Headquarters at Casa de Fervença, a Manor House, built at the end of the 16th century, which housed a chapel in memory of Our Lady of Ajuda. Despite all that had transpired, the Commandery organised and hosted an Investiture on 8th December 2017 at Casa de Fervença, when a member of the Clergy, three Knights and three Dames were invested. However, as a result of the ongoing situation, the Commandery did very little else apart from having a few meetings, Easter visits and attending some religious ceremonies.

HE Bailiff Roberto Volpe was well aware of our situation and when the Priory of Italy decided to embrace the OSJ, he



advised us of their intentions. We immediately made contact with HE Bailiff Martin Marschner von Helmreich and, following a meeting and discussions in Nice, our members agreed that we would follow the Priory of Italy and request permission to become members of OSJ. We are pleased that we have been accepted into the Order and that we are now accompanying all of you on our new and positive path. We very much look forward to meeting up with as many of you as possible once this coronavirus pandemic is resolved.

Some Interesting Information about the City of Barcelos

Barcelos is part of the UNESCO Creative Cities Network as a Crafts and Folk Art City and is famous for its textile and adobe industries, its horseback riding events and the "figurado" style of pottery, which includes comical figurines with accentuated features of farmers, folk musicians, and nativity scene characters. The city's famous symbol is a rooster, in Portuguese called "o Galo de Barcelos" (the Rooster of Barcelos). One of the many versions of the legend concerning the Rooster (and there are a few) is the story of a rich man who threw a big party and invited many guests. When the party was over, the rich man noticed that a guest had stolen his beautiful sterling silver cutlery. He accused a poor pilgrim of the theft and had him arrested, thrown into prison and taken to court. At his trial, the poor pilgrim protested his innocence, but the judge did not believe him and sentenced him to hang. However, the pilgrim noticed that the judge was about to eat a roasted rooster and he shouted out "If I am innocent, this rooster will crow three times". According to this version of the legend, just as the pilgrim was about

to be hanged, the rooster stood up on the table and crowed three times and the judge rushed to release the pilgrim. The story ends some years later when the pilgrim returned to Barcelos to sculpt the "Cruzeiro do Senhor do Galo" (the Crucifix to the Lord of the Rooster). The monument is now located in the archaeological museum of Barcelos.

PRIORY OF NSW & THE ACT CO

How the world can change! As I reviewed the Priory's Report that was included in the edition of the Hospitaller issued in January, I had cause to remember that at the time of its preparation we were just closing off what had been a very busy year that culminated with the holding of Sovereign Council in October 2019. Whilst we did not have as many attendees as we had hoped, we were however very thankful for our Brothers and Sisters who attended and had made the trip from faraway lands. The intention was to close off 2019 formally, and then ease into 2020; well, that was the theory anyway!

Later in 2019, we held our Annual Meeting in order to comply with the necessary local statutory requirements, and during this meeting we regretfully accepted Chev. Barnie McKinnon's resignation as Treasurer, as a result of him passing the Order's age threshold. He

was given much acclaim for his excellent work since originally joining Order and taking on the Treasurer's role; a position that is rarely fought for! it However, was extremely fortunate for the Priory that his son, Chev. Maurice McKinnon, who had been understudying his father as Vice Treasurer, was prepared to take on the role and he was unanimously elected as our new Treasurer. In honour and respect for both his service and his abilities, Barnie was elected to the unofficial role and title of "Assistant to the Treasurer"!

During our Annual Meeting we also saw Chev. Derek Robson step down from his role as Commander of the Commandery of the ACT (Australian Capital Territory). Finally, we closed the year with our annual message of loyalty to our Grand Master HRH Prince Karl Vladimir Karadjordjevic of Yugoslavia GCSJ, and the Princess, as we all looked forward to Christmas and the January holiday period, which is traditionally when most businesses in Australia close and take their leave as we celebrate the summer and welcome the arrival of a New Year.

Alas, events took a different turn and "welcome" was not the word for it! 2020 opened to the Country's worst bush fire season in over 80 years, events that were to receive worldwide news and notoriety. The fires devastated many areas and, regrettably, the publicity meant that many visitors, both

> local and international, did not travel, which resulted in further economic loss to the region. In addition, during this period we experienced many days when the temperature reached almost 50 degrees Celsius.

Priory jumped into gear and set about raising funds for the Bushfire victims, an appeal that was led by Chev. Maurice McKinnon. We are pleased to report that our appeal raised a total of \$5,000 from members and friends of the Order in an exceptionally short space of time. At the same time as we were raising funds for the victims of the fires there were many other organisations also appealing for funding, so to raise this amount of money was significant, and our Members and friends are to be congratulated on their efforts. Regrettably there has subsequently been issues raised

publicly about the efficacy of some of the other fundraisers efforts and their intents.


Given the adverse publicity concerning the use and timing of the funds raised by many of the charitable organisations, we wanted to ensure that our funds would be deployed to the 'front line' as quickly as possible. therefore decided to pay the cash raised directly to the Eden Country Women's Association (CWA) Appeal Account. The funds were then, at our request, used to acquire vouchers from local shops and suppliers, and the vouchers were then passed to members of the local community who were in need as a result of the fires. This process ensured that all of the funds raised by the Priory remained within the local area. The Eden CWA was more than happy with our proposed course of action and have advised us that the task has now been completed in accordance with our wishes. For anyone who doesn't know, Eden is located on the south coast of NSW, south of Bega and

We must all look forward to serving our communities locally, and to uniting with our Brothers and Sisters worldwide to continue to build the Order internationally.










A DEEP CONVICTION

That teaching is profound.

I have a deep conviction that there is one Divine Consciousness in which we all have our being and our expression, a consciousness so all encompassing, so all penetrating that there is nothing that is not embraced by it and within it. And within this unlimited field of conscious might, I experience a love transcendent illuminating the reaches of inner and outer space, enlivening the world I know and worlds I do not know, and my thought expands beyond thought into Light.


For me it has long been a tradition that my Godchildren come for Easter - 8 of them! But sadly not this year.
